The past year has been one with both challenges and triumphs.

Our team lived by our values and worked in **unity** through pandemic challenges. Their tenacity, dedication, and quality service delivery are admirable and a testament to their skill and care. It is a privilege and duty to serve our clients, and in a small way, be part of their life journeys.

We are excited about the new direction confirmed in our Strategic Plan 2030 where we aim to expand disability services and continue to offer a range of services to children and their whānau, and the elderly. The new Middle Road physical disability service in Havelock North is already housing four young flatters. Enliven Older People Services support clients in their homes and at day programmes to improve independence, quality of life, dignity, and social connections. Family Works in Hawke's Bay and Tairāwhiti deliver vital work in trying circumstances. Our clinical services are supported by the diligent head office team so that the "magic" can happen at the front line.

Our aspirations will only be possible with community support. This year we have **connected** with communities and been supported by generous staff, volunteers, parishes, financial donors, and business partners. We are grateful to our many supporters and encouraged that we share a mission of social change. Special acknowledgment goes to our Board of Governance for their **guardianship** of PSEC's resources, people, and physical assets. PSEC has been serving local communities for more than 77 years and, thanks to the Board leadership, will continue to do so **sustainably**.

Another year of significance for our organisation.

In November, the Board spent a facilitated day considering the future direction for PSEC. The strong themes emerging from this review were heavily influenced by government policies which are reshaping the future of healthcare and social services in New Zealand. The outcome of the day, followed by several months of refinement, will see the organisation significantly increase its focus in the disability sector while at the same time taking a considered view of existing eldercare and social services.

A second major initiative has been the purchase of Paige Hill, a property adjoining Arohiwi Station. The acquisition enables greater scale and farming efficiency as well as diversification into forestry, which aligns well with our sustainability objectives. Our thanks go to Peter Tod and the Arohiwi Board for the opportunity and extensive due diligence undertaken to enable this transaction.

Sanja has once again managed our organisation with calm assurance despite the ongoing challenges of staff shortages which have worsened with the recent waves of COVID-19. Our thanks to you and the entire team Sanja.

The Board welcomed two new members, Rebekah Dinwoodie and Farley Keenan, following a formalised recruitment process. At this year's annual meeting we will farewell Colleen Skuse, our Presbytery representative from Gisborne for the past ten years. I would like to record my thanks to all my Board colleagues for their contribution and support during the past year.

PSEC is a not-for-profit charity formed in 1946. We provide vital social services to East Coast disabled people, older people, and children and families.





Services are guided by our Environmental, Social, and Governance (ESG) principles

In 2021 PSEC partnered with sustainability experts at Massey University to help us become a sustainability-oriented organisation. After engaging with a range of stakeholders inside and outside PSEC, we are identifying priorities for action and reporting. This year ESG Sustainability has also been woven into our Strategic Plan, linking our commitment to sustainability with our core values of Kaitiakitanga, Whanaungatanga, and Kotahitanga.

Residential Services supports disabled people under 65 with a high level of complex needs at two locations, Rowan and Middle Road.

Rowan and Middle Road both aim to foster choice, working alongside flatters to support them to reach their potential. Over the 2021-22 financial year Rowan was home for 22 flatters and Middle Road was home for 4 flatters.
