Reflecting on the past year it is clear that it has been a year of challenge and renewed commitment to our vision of seeing **communities reaching their potential**.

For more than forty years we have offered trusted and respected disability services. One of the most exciting developments this year is the upgrade and expansion of our disability services. We are proud to announce the completion of the refurbished Rowan cottages, which were heavily impacted by Cyclone Gabrielle in 2023. Thanks to this work, we now have a better, more supportive environment for all twenty nine flatters we support. In addition, we are thrilled to share our commitment to build the new Rowan Apartments that will support four new flatters. Requiring an investment of \$3.5 million, supported by an incredibly generous \$1 million pledge from Royston Health Trust, this project is a symbol of what we can achieve when we build together. It is humbling to witness this level of support from people with strong social consciousness.

Our strategic direction has also seen some changes, particularly in Tairāwhiti, where we have made the very difficult decision to close our office after thirty years of presence there. We are moving towards sectors where we can have the biggest impact, and will be investigating how to close gaps in disability service delivery in Tairāwhiti.

In everything we do, we are guided by our commitment to sustainability and good governance. This year, we released our first Environmental, Social, and Governance (ESG) Report, a significant step forward in aligning our actions with our values. Our Value **Kaitiakitanga** (guardianship) speaks to our responsibility to

safeguard both our people and the environment. We are proud to support the people of the East Coast through our services while being mindful of our environmental impact. The 2023 ESG Report outlines our progress and is available to view on our website.

The heart of our organisation is our dedicated team of staff and volunteers. Their passion and professionalism was evident during the first PSEC Staff Conference last November. It was a memorable day of celebration, recognition, and connection, with Board members acknowledging the incredible work done throughout the year. We are grateful for the Board's steady stewardship during tough economic times. The courageous leadership at all organisational levels, from the Chair and the Board to our senior management team, remains one of PSEC's greatest strengths.

One highlight of the year was our leadership visit to the Kohupātiki Marae. This was a special moment of connection and reflection of our commitment to community partnerships.

Looking to the future, we are investing in significant advancements in technology. This year we have made considerable investments in automation and new IT systems, which are ensuring we are working effectively with the resources entrusted to us.

The Board extend our deepest thanks to our management team for their steadfast and stable leadership. With Sanja's guidance, the team's dedication, and the ongoing support of our community, we are confident that PSEC will continue to **lead social change with courage, care, and aroha**.

Services are guided by our Environmental, Social, and Governance (ESG) principles

Being a sustainability-oriented organisation means that we:

- promote environmental sustainability by monitoring and minimising, wherever possible, our impacts on the environment;
- promote social sustainability by making a positive difference in the lives of our clients, staff, and volunteers;
- ensure best-practice governance and stewardship within PSEC.

In 2023-2024 PSEC was proud to publish our first Environmental, Social and Governance (ESG) report, which is available for download from our website. Going forward, we aim to produce an ESG report every two years. PSEC has started promoting environmental sustainability at work. We have created an Environmental Sustainability information and resources page on our staff intranet, and we have formed a team of Eco Champions who will keep our services informed and inspired. Family Works staff led the way by building a vegetable garden outside their office – a fantastic initiative to enhance staff and client wellbeing.

Arohiwi Station

PSEC is the sole shareholder of Arohiwi Station Limited, a farm that was partly gifted to PSEC. Dividends from the farm support our social services.

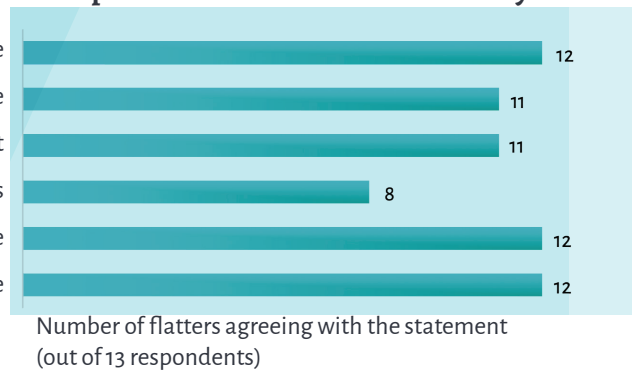


Residential Services supported 30 younger disabled people under 65 with a high level of complex needs at Rowan and Middle Road sites.

Rowan and Middle Road aim to foster choice, working alongside flatters to support them to reach their potential. Over the course of the year, Rowan was home for 20 flatters and Middle Road sites were home for 10 flatters.

In 2024, 13 flatters or their family members completed a client satisfaction survey.

Adult education and creative space courses are group based while other services work with individuals.

Older People



Intensive Home Support supports older people to stay independent and safe at home and delay rest home entry.

209 people supported to remain in their own homes and in their community

100% of clients supported by a multi-disciplinary team of registered nurses, social workers, physiotherapists, occupational therapists, dietitians and a speech-language therapist

97% of Key Support Workers qualified at NZQA Level 2 or higher, 79% at Level 3 and above

65,858 in-home support visits provided by Key Support Workers

Community Services includes Community Day Programmes and two Retirement Villages. Community Day Programmes support older people to remain motivated and socially connected, and offer carers regular breaks.

57 older people supported (50 live with Dementia) at Community Day Programmes

145 falls prevention exercise sessions delivered to Community Day Programmes attendees

17 new referrals enrolled to Community Day Programmes

52 people in our Retirement Villages:
JH Mason Retirement Village in Havelock North and Sheilton Village in Wairoa

Family Works East Coast



Family Works East Coast provides wrap-around early intervention services, using a mana enhancing bicultural approach with tamariki and whānau to overcome challenges around trauma, family violence, and child safety.

Our team provides confidential social work, counselling, and facilitated programmes responding to local needs. We work collaboratively with local community groups and services.

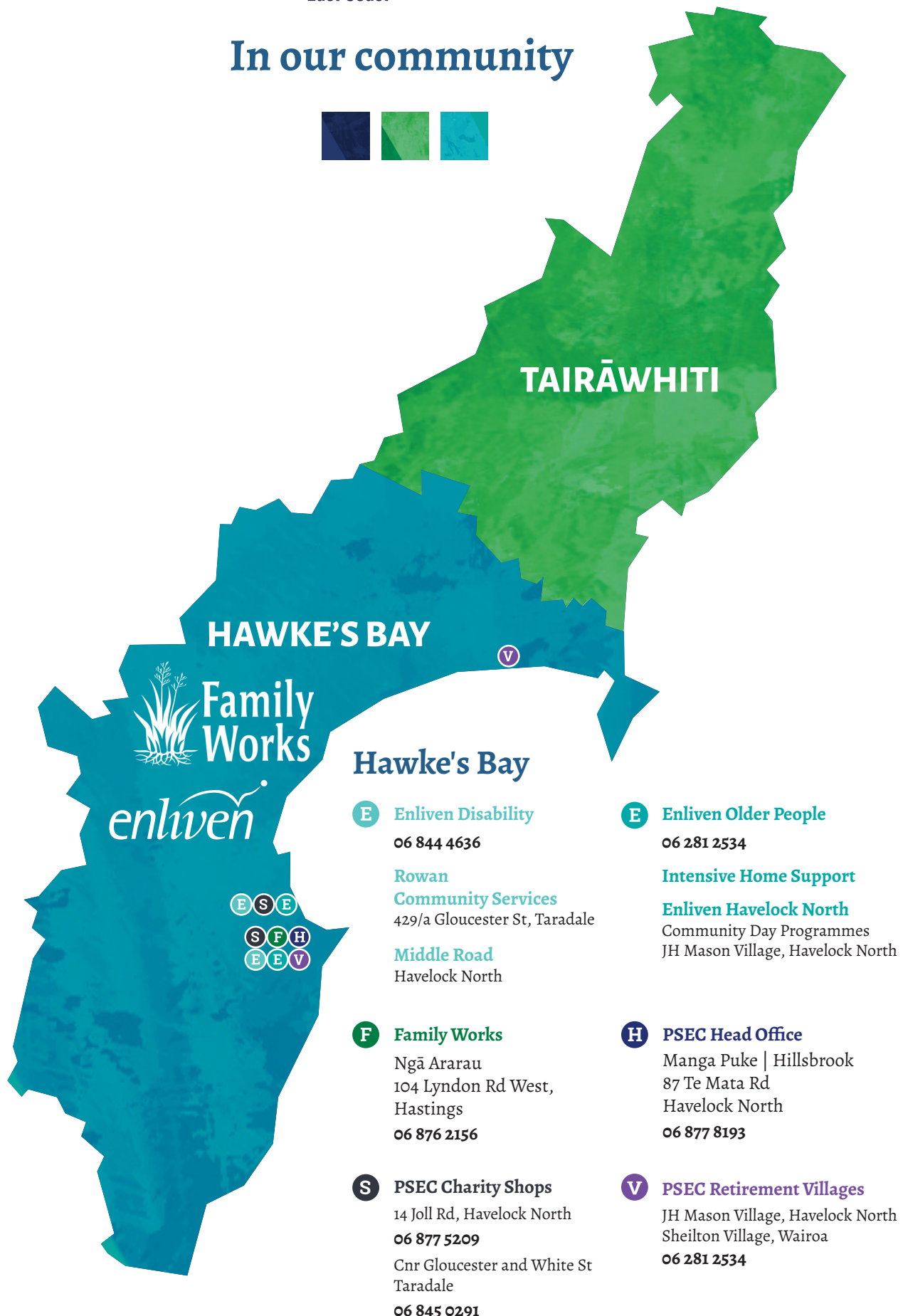
